## Creation: a Celebration Exhibition

Our hospitable North Transept was the site of a delightful exhibition of delicate embroidery, painting and calligraphy. The artist, Sue Symonds, had formed 42 exquisitely decorated panels which illustrate the account of Creation as described in the first chapter of Genesis.

Canon Stockton and Michael Howard introduced the programme for the evening, which was in two parts. (One fewer than Gaul, which Julius Caesar divided into three parts.)

The first part was an explanation of the artwork, which essentially meant that things that were worth doing needn't be massive, but could be small in their intricate beauty. William Blake summed it up in his Auguries of Innocence.

The Exhibition was launched at a Reception in our equally hospitable South Transept when delicious refreshments were served; **The Revd. Stephen Harvey**, Headmaster of Bury Grammar School, and a colleague, **Felicity Ackroyd**, enjoyed the refreshments.
