But, no – it's due to the outstanding talent of the brilliant musicians we have had the privilege of welcoming to Blackburn Cathedral for so many years and who have gone on to great things elsewhere.

Our former Director of Music, **GORDON STEWART**, will be leaving these shores in August to take up the post of Director of Music of Grace and St. Stephen's Church, Colorado Springs, Colorado, USA!

The church has a very fine musical tradition – there are **seven** choirs and a magnificent organ – and the worship is based on the Book of Common Prayer – i.e. 'trad'.

The church itself, built 80 years ago, was designed by the architects of Washington National Cathedral, and the superb bell tower is a replica of the tower of Magdalen College, Oxford!

I thought of you when I recently visited Limpsfield Church in Surrey where I have designed a 'Musicians' Window' funded by a number of eminent musical societies.

The church must be unique in having in its churchyard the graves of FREDERICK DELIUS and his wife, conductors SIR THOMAS BEECHAM and NORMAN DEL MARR, concert pianist EILEEN JOYCE (who played the Rachmaninov piano concerto for the film Brief Encounter), the HARRISON SISTERS (cello and Prof. DENIS STEVENS, Nightingale) English musicologist and Professor at Columbia University New York, and JACK BRYMER. clarinet virtuoso.

The window is designed round the seated figure of S. Cecilia holding her 'great engine' (not quite quite as large as the Blackburn organ) and based on the Auden verse which Britten set to music in his Hymn to St. Cecilia:

Blessed Cecilia, appear in visions To all musicians, appear and inspire. Translated daughter, come down and startle Composing mortals with immortal fire. Quite why all these musicians are buried in that churchyard I am not sure except in the case of Eileen Joyce who lived there. Beecham was apparently buried there after being exhumed from somewhere else!

As part of the transformation of the town centre, plans are also actively in hand to create a more traditional Cathedral Close, by building a Deanery, houses for the Canons, Director of Music and Virger, and some apartments for sale.

The area around the Cathedral has already been named the *Cathedral Quarter*, and of course, Church Street was spruced up for ...



#### The Dean writes:

The visit of Her Majesty The Queen had of course been planned for many months. Indeed, the initial idea was for her to attend a Service in the Cathedral but for a variety of reasons that became impractical. In the event the **Bishop** and I together with **Canon Clitherow** and two members of the Interfaith Council were invited to meet her.

The town had been well prepared for the visit. The Station where the Royal Train arrived at 9.54 am on **Ascension Day, 25 May 2006** had been re-tiled, the grills in Church Street had all been polished and the Cathedral gardens looked as good as I've ever seen them.



The Cathedral party were invited by the Borough Council to Café Beee's *(sic)* beforehand (one of the refurbished Pavilions). There was an obvious air of nervousness and unreality as we shared a drink and conversation with some of the region's

movers and shakers. The Cathedral bells rang to signal the Queen's arrival at the Station and we spilled out onto a cheerful and sunny Church Street, which was impressively full of onlookers.

The Queen, in Emerald Green and the Duke (a nimble nearly 85 years old) progressed slowly up Church Street obviously enjoying the crowds and the happy atmosphere. Her Majesty was then introduced to the Bishop who then introduced us one by one.



I explained that the Cathedral could just be seen above the Pavilions. We turned and gazed at the spire. (That was when **Phil Hunwick** took his impressive though mischievous photo with caption!)



She enquired about the age of the building and the new extension. The Queen then moved on and was followed by The Duke, with whom I had a longer conversation about much the same thing, though he wanted to know a little more about the diocese, its age and its relationship with the Cathedral. I'm relieved to say that I could talk positively and in an informed way about our current very good relationships with the diocese. They passed on to the top of Church Street, where Her Majesty unveiled a plaque to mark the re-development of the Mall Shopping Centre.



[The plaque was removed the next day but will be reinstated when the £47M redevelopment scheme is completed! So we'll have to make do with the 12 ft high Monster face which dominates Church Street! 'We're making Monster changes to the Mall'. See www.themall.co.uk Edl

It was a great privilege to meet both The Queen and The Duke. (Though I had been in their company before, I had never been formally introduced.) It was an even greater benefit to Blackburn for it has given the town a real confidence boost just as it finds itself on the cusp of Regeneration – a profoundly biblical concept in which the Cathedral's development plan plays a significant role. It is acting as a catalyst for the re-population of the town centre, the green shoots for which are now clearly visible.

## FIVE AMAZING DAYS IN BLACKBURN CATHEDRAL Wednesday to Sunday, 21-25 June, 2006 Day 1: Royal Gala Concert in the presence of HRH Princess Alexandra

**Richard Tanner** with the boy choristers and members of the Girls' Chamber Choir had been working right up to the last minute to prepare the music for a most unusual, yet wildly successful concert which, as ever, had attracted a capacity audience.

So last-minute was it that Richard was only told at 2.30 that afternoon that, due to a mix-up, he was to conduct a performance with full orchestra, of Vaughan Williams' *Lark Ascending!* He did it superbly, of course.

The concert had been organised by Mrs. Gail Stanley, MBE,



former High Sheriff, who had gathered together a powerful committee which not only took care of all the logistical details for the concert, from *'No Parking in the Cathedral Close that day'* and the hiring of lighting and amplification experts who filled the cathedral with their efficient equipment, to making appeals to those who have this world's goods to raise money for the Prince's Trust. Mrs. Stanley told your editor that while many people and organizations had responded generously to the Appeal, some did not even bother to reply. 'It's been very hard work,' she said.

But the hard work paid off handsomely.

When your staff reporter entered the cathedral that afternoon he was greeted by a gale of sound coming from powerful loudspeakers which were amplifying the singing of our two star soloists, PHILIPPA HYDE and Presenter ALED JONES, a regular broadcaster on BBCTV and radio!

They rehearsed for nearly 2 hours – a popular programme, including Handel's *Silent Worship*, Rutter's *For the beauty of the earth*, Mendelssohn's O *for the wings of a dove*, Schubert's *Ave Maria*, and so much more.

Our boys and girls matched the professionalism of the orchestra and worked very hard, producing exquisite sounds. During the concert Aled Jones praised the young singers, saying that they were some of the finest choristers in Britain. This was greeted by tumultuous applause.(Can you spot 6-year old **William Fielding**?)

Aled Jones also announced that it was **Alison Holmes**' 13<sup>th</sup> birthday that day. She was given a mighty cheer! (Alison is 2<sup>nd</sup> from the right, back row.



After the rehearsal the musicians had their supper in the crypt while the official guests began to gather in the North Transept to be presented the HRH Princess Alexandra, who had last visited the cathedral 29 years ago for its final Consecration.

Not only did the Princess speak at length to everyone she met, but she also met distinguished guests who were enjoying preconcert refreshments in the North Transept.



**Gail Stanley** (centre) presented **Edwin Booth** (left) and his party, while two press photographs – right - (and your staff photographer) tried to capture every moment.

Gerry Armstrong, Shirley Watson (wife of Blackburn with Darwen Chief Executive, Phil Watson) and Mary and Chris Chivers waited their turn patiently and were eventually rewarded. Some of us were presented twice, before and after the concert!



And then the concert began – and what a concert! After the National Anthem (which we all sang lustily) Richard conducted a spirited performance of Mozart's Overture to *Don Giovanni*. This was followed by **Aled Jones** (who is a former chorister of Bangor Cathedral) singing *Silent Worship*. Everyone could see our

soloists, choir and orchestras up close, for a giant screen had been erected in each aisle relaying images from a powerful camera halfway down the Nave.



Our choristers excelled themselves in singing For the beauty of the earth, accompanied so colourfully by the orchestra.



The singing of our own Philippa Hyde was not only exquisite, but it also filled the cathedral with soaring silver sounds as she sang O for the wings of a Dove, accompanied by our choristers, followed by a scintillating performance of Mozart's Exsultate Jubilate. This brought the first half to a superb conclusion.





Then the entire audience was treated to a champagne reception in the transepts.

Enjoying the liquid refreshments were Judge Brian & Carolyn Duckworth, and Sheila Walker. Meanwhile the Dean asked your staff photographer to be sure to take a photo of the Princess when she signed the Visitors' Book in the Jesus Chapel.

The commission was fulfilled, but not before HRH noticed your staff photographer suitably on his knees before Royalty! (Next to the Princess is Mrs. Stanley, and far left is Lady Shuttleworth.)

The second half of the programme was as exciting as the first: favourite after favourite boomed out through the excellent loudspeakers as soloists, choir and orchestra under the superb leadership of Richard Tanner, performed You raise me up, The Lark Ascending, Summertime (Philippa Hyde), If it's Magic, and your editor's newly orchestrated version of his Steal Away. (HRH and Mrs. Stanley followed the music in their specially printed copies.)

The concert ended with everyone joining in *How great thou art,* and an encore, *All through the night* (in Welsh and English). The packed audience gave the musicians a well-deserved ovation,



and two young choristers, **Christopher Snape & Nikki Zohdi** presented enormous bouquets to Pippa and Aled.



And then, in the crypt, some of the cathedral musicians were lining up to be presented to the Princess by Richard Tanner.

## Inaugural William Temple Lecture

given by

## The Right Reverend N T Wright Bishop of Durham



**Bishop Tom Wright** is one of the world's leading scholars on the New Testament, and especially on the letters of Paul. He is also a member of the Eames Commission currently pondering the crisis within Anglicanism caused by the consecration of an openly gay bishop in the United States. **Bishop Nicholas** and **Dean Christopher** introduced the bishop to a large and appreciative audience which filled the Nave, who listened intently as he argued his case for *Believing in the Real World. The Challenge of Faith to Secularism and Fundamentalism.* The audience asked many searching questions afterwards. Look up 'bishop wright durham' on the web and you'll discover mind-blowing articles by him and about him.



Advancing faith as the answer to secularism and fundamentalism, he captivated his audience with an invitation to <u>get real</u>, and thus to deal with the *reality of the world* rather than a world which some commentators would have us seduced into accepting as reality.

Taking a broad view across some very important history especially since the Enlightenment in the eighteenth century - he showed how secularists had increasingly been concerned to have religion seen as a private enterprise, and to keep it off the public stage. This, he suggested, was a denial of the truth of religions, for they are inextricably linked to the whole of life not merely the private domain.

He also illustrated the way in which religions had been forced towards fundamentalism - if you turn the garden of the world into a patio by trying to concrete over it and forcing religion underground, is it any surprise when some forms of religion force themselves back through the concrete?

What was needed, he argued, was more reasoned and reasonable religion. And in clear references to the Anglican tradition of Richard Hooker - which focuses on a balance of scripture, reason and tradition as the formula for theology, in other words, for our thinking about God and his world - he strongly advocated the importance of reasoned discourse and



dialogue, rather than the poor shouting match which can often pass for such discourse when secularists in the media bleat on about religion as being damaging and dangerous.

As a lecture it was a tour de force which held his 400 strong audience for almost an hour, after which he answered questions in a delightfully informal and accessible way.



It was wonderful for me to be reminded of what I had missed most at Westminster Abbey when I was Precentor. after Bishop Tom, who had been a Residentiary Canon there, left to go to Durham: the clarity, breadth and depth of the sermons and lectures he had delivered at the Abbey were outstanding.



Bishop Tom, as our own Bishop Nicholas who chaired the lecture. and Dean Christopher welcomed who the Bishop of Durham, agreed afterwards, has set a standard of debate and thoughtfulness which lecturers in the future will find hard to match. C.C.

## Day 3: Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> June. **Organ Virtuoso DAVID BRIGGS** gave two seminars on our cathedral organ to 400 young schoolchildren.



In the morning 300 children sat spellbound by his captivating talk and immediate interaction, and a further 100 children were equally fascinated by what he had to say, and the way he said it, in the afternoon.

He asked many questions (and found out each child's name when he or she answered) and he laced his comments with rare good humour. ("What do Martians eat? Mars Bars!")

and his control was astonishing. When he asked one child to help him, a teacher remarked, "That one's trouble!" But he wasn't, for David had him 'eating out of his hand!'

He had them blowing an organ pipe to see how it sounded,



He had them playing chords on the organ to see what sounds the different stops made.

And they gathered round the console in groups whilst he played for them.

And he made them laugh. It was an amazing experience to be there!







When your editor asked him how he had acquired such easy control of the children he said, "I've read your books!"

David Briggs is such a natural teacher, as well as an organ virtuoso and gifted composer. It was a privilege as well as a joy to watch him.

## Day 4: Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> June World Premiere of DAVID BRIGGS' ORGAN CONCERTO

There's never been an event like it in Blackburn Cathedral!

David Briggs' Organ Concerto is a world-class composition which will be played wherever there's an organ and an orchestra to play it. And he wrote it for us! Specifically for Conductor RICHARD TANNER and Organist GREG MORRIS.

DAVID had flown from New York with his wife, MADGE, for this performance (see photo front cover).

He had also brought members of his family – especially his Mother, JANE, who had been with him when he gave his very first public recital in Blackburn Cathedral over 30 years ago when he was 14!



But before the concert Canon Chris Chivers and David Briggs gave a seminar before a fascinated audience of musicians who wanted to know how David had written such a work.



'I just wrote it down, having worked out the forms I would use.' *Did you have to rewrite any of it?* 'Not really. It's rather like improvisation – you can't go back to change something that you've already played!'

We were so taken aback by this that very few of us dared to ask any questions but eagerly looked forward to hearing the work which David had specially created for us.

We all repaired to a Reception in the North Transept (there's *always* a Reception in the North Transept!) where the principal sponsors for the concerto, Dr. CHARLES & SHARYN MAGEE from Princeton, NJ, met David and Madge at the table where they were selling CDs of the Concerto (and of David's lovely *Requiem*), which Richard and Greg and the Northern Chamber Orchestra had recorded so superbly 6 months ago.



And they also enjoyed meeting the Dean who, with the Canons, is always so supportive of the ambitious and most excellent music being made in the cathedral right now.





Funding for this concert had also been generously given by JAY HUTSON and Dr. JOHN MOSES – who also come from the USA, but are now living near Blackburn and are regular members of

our congregation. We are deeply indebted to all our Patrons and Sponsors, and the Friends of Blackburn Cathedral Music, without whose generosity such concerts would not be possible.

Special guests were organ virtuoso WAYNE MARSHALL, dazzling organist of the Bridgewater Hall, Manchester, and



DAVID WOOD from Huddersfield who, with his team, made sure that the organ was pristinely tuned and ready for this major concert. It was!

#### WORLD PREMIERE OF THE BRIGGS CONCERTO

This was a stunning success. As Greg Morris, the brilliant soloist, and the Northern Chamber Orchestra under Richard Tanner, had recorded it only 6 months earlier, the performance was guaranteed to be inspired. It was!



The audience enjoyed close-ups of the soloist thanks to a giant screen and a splendid camera operated by Dr. Paul Wright and Andrew Stringer from St. Anne's Church, Fence. The sounds of the orchestra – ranging from full-blooded to delicate writing for harp and xylophone, plus equally dramatic dynamic ranges for the organ – from almost inaudible Celestes to full organ with virtuoso playing by Greg's hands and feet, ensured that the audience was also kept on its toes!

CDs of David Briggs Organ Concerto with Richard & Greg, plus a recording of his exquisite *Requiem Mass,* may be ordered. Call the Cathedral Music Office: 01254-50-30-91 Needless to say, the performance was greeted with rapturous applause and flowers were presented to Greg and Richard. Richard presented his to David!



And then David was 'on stage' again; this time to improvise on themes to be submitted by the audience. However, Ben Holland, the orchestra's leader, quickly stepped in, saying, 'I have a theme,' and he promptly played a well-known theme by Haydn on which David improvised for over 20 dazzling minutes.



It was such a privilege to sit, literally, at the feet of one of the world's greatest organists. And then there was another Reception.



And then came the second half of the programme, which was devoted to a performance of Maurice Duruflé's lovely *Requiem,* beautifully sung by the Renaissance Singers. with Helen Francis, mezzo-soprano, and Marcus Farnsworth, baritone.

David Briggs' own response to this performance is worth quoting – from his letter of thanks to Richard Tanner:



**Dear Richard** 

Thanks so much for Saturday night. I was thrilled beyond measure at the way you directed the new Concerto - just the right tempi and degree of nuance.... perfect.

And the Duruflé was one of the most highly charged performances I've ever heard. Thank you very much indeed.

We're in Paris for a few days 'detente' in the middle of a wall-to-wall June/July concert schedule. It's good to be back in the most beautiful city in the world again..

See you very soon - and have a good summer.

## Day 5: SUNDAY 25<sup>th</sup> June The 90<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Battle of the Somme

The cathedral was full, yet again, for the Annual Somme Day Service – which commemorates the battle in France, begun at 7.30 am on 1<sup>st</sup> July 1916. During that day thousands of lives were lost – especially lives of soldiers from Lancashire. The Battle lasted 4 months – the army advanced only 6 miles and a million soldiers lay dead.



The commemoration Eucharist was conducted by the Dean who also preached most movingly. The first lesson was read by Brigadier G. P. Sheldon of The Queen's Lancashire Regiment, and it was inspiring to see the Standards presented to the Dean at the beginning for the service, to be placed around the altar during this act of Remembrance and Thanksgiving.



The music of the cathedral choir and organ was reinforced by the band of the Lancashire Royal Artillery. It was a worthy occasion.

#### GREAT NEWS FROM our 2003 organ scholar ALEX DAVIES

#### Dear John,

As you may have read the old Hele organ in my church here in Lyme Regis, Dorset, had a fire recently while I was practising the Sparrow Mass for a local choral society concert. Smoke filled the gallery floor up to my knees! The poor old instrument has been limping along for some time but has served us valiantly over the years; it was the first organ I ever heard and inspired me to learn - so must be thankful for that despite its obvious problems.



The fire two weeks before the Appeal Launch was amazing timing. It really brought home to many that the organ really was failing significantly, no matter how hard I tried to play well at services and to make the best of bits of the instrument that worked that day. It was the first time it had been silenced in the church for over 70 years!

When we first started talking about a new organ 18 months ago I was obviously very excited. I had the honour of inviting many different builders to view the instrument, all of whom said nothing was worth re using and suggested we should start a fresh.

With initial guidance from Peter Halls our organ advisor, our Vicar John Harrison and I discussed a new 2 manual tracker of about 24 stops positioned on the west gallery with all the builders. I must admit, when the quotes started coming in my initial enthusiasm was tempered with the huge cost. I was thinking about my local town raising all that money and justifying its cost! However after discussing it with John, we forged ahead formed our organ committee and got things going. Since then many little things keep happening at our church and in the life of the town and keep reminding me that despite the weight of the appeal we are doing the right thing!

The Organ Appeal Launch attended by the Archdeacon of Sherborne, Paul Taylor (who's also an organist), the Town Mayor and over 120 people from the area, included a display – a superb power point presentation by our chairman and a member of the congregation, Andrew Nicholson. Andrew is another one of those people who keep coming right. He is Director of Nicholson Church bell hangers, played Clarinet for the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, has enormous mechanical and musical knowledge, (recently repaired the fire damaged organ blower!) is supremely organised unlike me and is used to major church appeals. Could there be anyone better...and in Lyme?!

Anyway the launch event was a great success; fifteen minutes before the start, I was nervously checking over the sponsor register for all the pipes of the new organ. An early arrival asked me what I was doing - he left having donated the Open Diapason stop! If ever a start for the evening - that was it! A wonderful evening was enjoyed by all, the appeal now stands at £67,000.

The organ committee had realised that the old organ could fail at any time and considering that a new organ would take several months to install, an instrument might be needed. Remembering the Tickell chamber organ at Blackburn, I suggested we buy one which would get us through should the organ fail, it might also hold its value should we need to sell it to complete the fundraising.

While searching for chamber organs we came across Anton Skrabl an organ builder from Slovenia.

Skrabl does not yet have an organ in the UK, so despite listening to numerous superb recordings, we had to visit Slovenia to play them and see for ourselves. None of our advisors at

## Diocesan level were able to come, so I rather gingerly called Richard Tanner to see if he and his family could spare him three days from Easter Monday!

Slovenia was fantastic; a demanding three-day trip enabled us to try many different organs all over the country and into Austria. Richard was superb and was eagerly putting all the different organs through their paces and Bach's Toccata and Fugue in D minor at 1 am after an 16 hour day, was sensational although we were worried the police we going to turn up!

A visit to the factory was amazing to see so many new instruments being built.



Skrabl produces every component of his organs in a high tech modern factory employing over 50 staff. Andrew was thrilled with the quality of work he was seeing and Richard was entertaining us and factory workers busy playing various organs around the shop floor, including a little house organ that caught his eye!...



To date we have a preliminary specification drawn up and a fixed price so we could confidently launch the appeal knowing what we are aiming for! I feel privileged to be part of the committee who has this wonderful opportunity to provide an exciting new instrument for Lyme Regis. But I must thank Blackburn for the many experiences and ideas which are helping me to achieve our appeals aim.

Many thanks for your enthusiasm for our project and I hope some details can be included in the Newsletter as you suggest. Sorry it taken me a few days to write but extremely busy rehearsing children for our RNLI concert, practising and organising for several other concerts for our appeal this summer (see www.lymeregisorganappeal.com for details), teaching and also running my parents' Hote!!
