"Yes," agreed JB, "I remember you as a tenor in Blackburn Cathedral choir when I first came 18 years ago (Wow)."

Trevor Dearing was going to speak, and someone tried to persuade me to go. I didn't really want to, but because I was curious to see the man, I went.

## LETTER OF RESIGNATION

With the active help of the Provost I have been offered the post of Director of Music of Trinity Church, Princeton, New Jersey 08540, U.S.A., starting on 1st January 1983. I therefore submit to the Chapter of Blackburn Cathedral my resignation from the post of Organist and Master of the Choristers.

I would like to take this opportunity to record my deep gratitude to so many loyal and valued friends who have encouraged and sustained me throughout my eighteen years in this post. I recall with pride the many privileges which have been mine during these eventful and happy years: - Seeing the complete transformation of the Cathedral since 1964, when I was instructed

to have the old organ dismantled prior to work commencing on the redecoration of the nave,

- Directing the music for the re-hallowing of the nave in October 1965 in the presence of HRH Princess Margaret with Dr. Francis Jackson at the organ, and also directing the music for the final consecration of the Cathedral in 1977 in the presence of HRH Princess Alexandra,

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But, above all, I would like to thank all those who made my mother and me feel such welcome members of the Cathedral family and who gave us of their love unstintingly. My mother enjoyed many love-filled years among you all after my father's sudden death, and for this I bless you. I am proud that she will be for ever commemorated by the handsome silver choirmedallion created by Leslie Durbin through the generosity of her many friends and I shall ever remember with painful joy her magnificent funeral services in the Cathedral which were attended by the entire clerical staff of the Cathedral with Bishop Martineau, both my choirs and so many of her friends. I rejoice that my parents' ashes rest safely in this place, which I shall always think of as home.

I pray that my successor may be welcomed, helped, supported and guided as surely as I have been.
